**Hyannis Access Implementation**

BARNSTABLE COUNTY, MA -- The Cape Cod Commission will hold a public informational meeting about the Hyannis Access Implementation project on Wednesday, June 20, 2012, beginning at 6:00 p.m. at Barnstable Town Hall.

The project extends from the Cape Cod Mall traffic light on Route 28 to the Barnstable/Yarmouth town line and includes a portion of Route 132 near the Barnstable (Hyannis) Municipal Airport and a portion of Yarmouth Road (see aerial image on next page). The project will identify preferred long-term solutions for traffic congestion and management, which includes replacement of the Airport Rotary.

During the June 20th meeting, the Cape Cod Commission transportation staff will make a presentation to update participants on the status of the project and the process for public participation. The Commission is working closely with a task force, including municipal officials, transportation providers, businesses, abutters, and elected officials, on the project.
