Public Workshop Set for February 24, 2015:

Route 6 Corridor Study North Eastham to South Wellfleet

BARNSTABLE COUNTY, MA – Cape Cod Commission staff will host a public “kick-off” workshop for the *Route 6 Corridor Study: North Eastham to South Wellfleet* on **Tuesday, February 24, 2015**, at Eastham Town Hall , 2500 State Highway/Route 6, from **4 – 5:30 p.m.** The purpose of the meeting is to obtain public input about transportation issues and problem areas along the Route 6 corridor between Brackett Road in North Eastham and Village Lane in South Wellfleet.

The Commission is conducting a transportation planning study for this 1.6 mile segment of the Route 6 corridor to examine safety and access issues along the way and to develop alternatives that will provide safe and convenient access for all users of the roadway system, including pedestrians, bicyclists, and motorists. The workshop agenda includes a mapping exercise where participants will be asked to identify “trouble” spots - including bicycle and pedestrian accessibility, motor vehicle speeds, congestion, and drainage issues- as well as features that they like about the corridor.

Public participation is an important component of the study. In addition to public meetings, opportunities to provide written comments and review project- related information will also be available through the Commission’s website.
