Public Workshop Set for June 15, 2016:

Outer Cape Bicycle and Pedestrian Master Plan

BARNSTABLE COUNTY, MA – Representatives from Provincetown, Truro, Wellfleet, Cape Cod National Seashore, and the Cape Cod Commission will host the fourth in a series of public workshops on the Outer Cape Bicycle and Pedestrian Master Plan on **Wednesday, June 15 2016, at the Truro Community Center (7 Standish Way, N. Truro) from 6:30 – 8:00 p.m.**

The National Park Service, through Cape Cod National Seashore, is partnering with the towns and the Commission to develop plans for an interconnected bicycle/pedestrian network linking the towns with the Seashore, the Cape Cod Rail Trail, and other destinations within the communities.

The Master Plan project is funded by a Paul S. Sarbanes Transit in the Parks grant, a Federal Transit Administration program established to address increasing vehicle congestion in and around national parks and other federal lands.

The purpose of the workshop is to present elements of the Draft Master Plan, including the recommended primary route through the region and secondary routes in each town. Attendees will help determine priorities for the secondary routes and brainstorm possible solutions for a few challenging locations. Previous workshops provided input on the preferred primary route and appropriate facility design along primary and secondary routes.
