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The Regional Policy Plan mentions climate change and sea level rise but does not emphasize these features, which I believe are the major problems facing Cape Cod in the future. Sea level is increasing rapidly, which will result in Cape Cod shrinking as coastal land is flooded. I live near Nobska Lighthouse which is about to be located on an island as low-land surrounding the lighthouse is flooded with sea water during major storms (as it was during Hurricane Bob with a lower sea level). The shores of Falmouth and other coastal towns are barely above sea level now. In a decade or two these coastal lands will be flooded and houses and other buildings destroyed. The commission should explain and take into consideration the rapid rates of sea level increase. Inhabitants of Cape Cod need to become active in discussing this impending disaster and figuring out how to help mitigate the increase in global warming and sea level rise. We need to act now. If the people of Cape Cod are made aware of the impending disaster they can be helpful in solving the human-made climate problems. We the people of Cape Cod need to put pressure on our political leaders to help Cape Cod and Massachusetts deal very soon with sea level rise and coastal land loss. The Cape Cod Commission needs to guide the people of Cape Cod on how to deal with this major crisis. In my opinion the report downplays this critical aspect and should emphasize it. Cape Cod is an island that will shrink in the future. We need to think about it in those terms and come to terms with it.
