

The Murchison House is a large Modern/International style dwelling that is located on a bluff overlooking Provincetown Harbor in the far West End. The residence has a cruciform layout at its lower level, and rises to resemble a rectangular flat-roofed main story with full length windows, and Japanese inspired screens and arched entrance. The architects of the Murchison House were The Architect's Collaborative (TAC), a group of architects led by Walter Gropius, founder of the Bauhaus in Germany and Head of the Harvard Design School from 1938 until 1952. Gropius believed that architecture should be functional and easy to mass produce, and be aimed to combine art, craft and technology to achieve these goals. Robert S. McMillan was the partner-in-charge of the project. McMillan was one of the eight founders of TAC and remained with the firm until 1963 when he left to open his own office. TAC, which existed from 1945 until 1995, focused on Gropius' belief in design as a social exercise. Though one partner would manage each project, the design process was collaborative. As the first modern dwelling built in Provincetown, the Murchison House is a rare high-style residence on the Outer Cape. The Murchison House is intact and in good condition. Retaining integrity of location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling, and association, Murchison House meets Criteria C of the National Register at the local level.



3 Water Street is a Greek Revival former house/shop set into a sloping site with an exposed lower level along the front (south) elavation and partially along the side elavations. The house form consists of a one and one-half-story, three-bay by four-bay, gable-front main block followed by a one-and one-half-story rear ell-which continues the fiscade pinne and roof slope on the west elevation and is set back with a shallower roof pitch on the east elevation, followed by a one-story rear ell. The house rests on a grante block foundation except for the one-story rear ell-which has a concrete foundation. The walls are sheathed in wood clapboard and have corner plasters with recessed panels. Until the restoration of this siding in 2012, the building had been sheathed in asbestos siding for much of the 20th century. The roof is clad in wood shingle and has a molded box comice with partial returns across the gable ends and wood guiters with galvanized metal downspouls. Corbetted brick chimmeys rise from the east and west roof slopes of the main block. Four-small skylights have been installed on the east roof slope and two on the west roof slope. Pursuant to the 2012 comprehensive building restoration, the wood clapboard is new, some of the tim was replaced-in-kind, gutters were replaced-in-kind, some of the

The front (south) elevation is fully sheathed in wood clapboard, including the exposed lower level.
